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
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The Youth Orchestra is a Queens-based youth orchestra since 1996, and has been a 501 (c) (3) organization since 2002. Its mission is to provide orchestra training and performing opportunities for musical students age 10 - 18, with unique repertory that includes Classical, Popular, Jazz, Broadway, Film, and Asian music. The orchestra premieres and commissions works by American and Asian composers and has organized 11 summer concert tours to Asia, Europe and the West Coast for global cultural experiences.

New members are recruited through auditions in September and January. Weekly rehearsals take place at Middle School 158 in Bayside, New York from September to June. Faculty members are: Chijen Christopher Chung (music director and strings teacher), ChiChing Grace Lin (percussion), Lovell Park Chang (winds and brass), Tony Huang (strings), and Hsinyi Huang (librarian). The orchestra presents two formal concerts annually: a holiday concert, free for the community during the holiday season in Queens, and an annual concert at Lincoln Center in the spring. The Orchestra also serves the Queens community by performing concerts at senior enters, community centers, and nursing homes.

Highlights for the 2018 - 2019 season included the Holiday Concert 2018 at Cardozo High School in Bayside on December 16; a student and faculty recital at Taiwan Center in Flushing on March 30, a performance at the Taiwan Center in Flushing on May 18th, and tonight's annual concert at Alice Tully Hall. 紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團

紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團成立於1996年,自1997年向紐約州政府註册爲非營利機構,1998至2007年列入紐約市政府燈塔計劃(The Beacon Program)。1999年起至今多次獲得紐約市皇后藝術基金協會(Queens Council on the Arts)、紐約州藝術基金協會(New York State Council on the Arts)、紐約州藝術基金協會(New York City Council)、紐約市議員顧雅明(New York City Council Member Peter Koo)及JP Morgan Chase銀行等頒發獎助基金;並獲綠洲基金會、台灣僑務委員會、駐紐約台北經濟文化辦事處、台北文化中心以及紐約華僑文教服務中心支持。

自1998年以來,紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團所推出的《聖誕音樂會 Holiday Concert》成爲皇后區聖誕佳節傳統慶典之一。紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團秉持著「服務社區・教育英才」和「幼吾幼以及人之幼」的理念,在社區中多次親善演出,行跡遍及圖書館、公園、學校、社區之耆老,醫療與復健中心等。除每年定期於皇后區舉辦聖誕音樂會與林肯中心年度音樂會之外,曾舉辦九次美亞巡迴(1997、1999、2002、2005、2007、2010、2012、2015、2018)、兩次美國西岸(1998、2000)以及歐洲(2006)演奏之旅,於舊金山、洛杉磯、聖地牙哥、夏威夷、臺北、宜蘭、台中、鹿港、高雄、金門、廈門、北京、上海、香港、大阪、東京、橫濱、維也納、薩爾斯堡、布拉格等地,舉辦過數十場親善交流音樂會,不僅開拓了團員們的視野,也達到音樂交流的使命。

2015年7月,紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團和台灣新北市大豐國小校友管弦樂團共赴東京音樂大學以及台北市福華國際文教中心與當地音樂學生親善交流和共同演奏音樂會;2018年夏天與桃園六和國中管弦樂團、台中安和國中管樂團及澳門聖公會中學樂團於台中交流,並赴日本橫濱Minato Mirai Hall載譽演出並兼就地旅遊。

紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團招收團員年齡自10歲至18歲,來自預約甄試,經錄取後,每年九月至次年五月之每週六下午一時至四時,假皇后區貝賽158初中(Marie Curie Middle School)排練;由資優老師林季靜、張若葳、張紀葳、黃東瀛等指導,而由鍾啓仁擔任音樂總監及指揮。

紐約幼獅青少年管弦樂團2018-19年度舉行之三場大型音樂會分別為:聖誕音樂會(2018年12月16日)於法拉盛舉行的台灣會館音樂會(2019年5月18日),林肯中心年度音樂會(2019年6月9日);演出的曲目包括:古典、流行、爵士、百老匯、電影及亞洲音樂;更開創《幼獅師生才藝表演音樂會》,訂於2019年3月30日在紐約台灣會館舉行,由本團師生演出獨奏和重奏之室內樂。

Chijen Christopher Chung, Music Director / Conductor 音樂總監•指揮 鍾啓仁老師



A native of Kaohsiung, Taiwan, Mr. Chung began his musical studies in piano, violin and cello at the ages of five and nine. Following a successful musical career in high school, he attended the National Taiwan Normal University where he majored in cello, minored in piano and was awarded the Certificate of Music Education.

Upon moving to the United States, Mr. Chung studied under the tutelage of cellist Peter Wiley (of Guarneri String Quartet), at Conservatory of Music at Purchase College, SUNY, where he received both his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Music Performance.

Mr. Chung's wide professional experience encompasses symphony orchestra and chamber music performances, conducting, teaching, studio recording and administration. He served as Associate Principal Cellist of the Taipei Symphony Orchestra, Principal Cellist of the Yin-Qi Symphony Orchestra & Chorus, and the Yin-Qi Chamber Orchestra in Taiwan. He performed with the Chinese Community Chamber

Orchestra at Carnegie Hall, New York Symphony Orchestra and the Amadeus String Quartet and Piano Trio.

Mr. Chung's teaching positions were at the Guang-Ren High School, Xi-Men Elementary School, and Guan-Du Christian College in Taiwan. He has been serving as the Music Director, cello and piano instructor at the Song of Songs Music School, Eastern School of Music, Amadeus Conservatory of Music, and Melody Time Music Center in the United States.

In 2003, he was the Music Director and featured cellist for the world premiere of an original Chinese-language adaptation of A Streetcar Named Desire at the Hwa-Sun Culture Center in Taipei, Taiwan.

With Youth Orchestra, CYCNY, at Alice Tully Hall of Lincoln Center, Chung performed Elgar's Cello Concerto as soloist in 2010, and Chung conducted the World Premiere of Yasuhiko Fukuoka's "Journey of a Thousand Miles" in 2012; the World Premiere of Steve Margoshes's "Symphony Dance from FAME- The Musical", as well as the US Premiere of Shui-Long Ma's "Searching" Concerto for Gu-Zheng and Orchestra, with Hao-Yin Huang as Gu-Zheng soloist in 2013; US Premiere Fu-Tong Wong's Symphony Condor Hero in 2014, and World Premiere Justine F. Chen's Mimesis Violin Concert with Min Yen Chien as violin soloist in 2016; and Hansol Choi's Higgaion Percussion Concert with Chi-Ching Grace Lin as percussion soloist in 2018.

Mr. Chung has long believed that music has the power to transform lives, to transcend cultures and languages and to bring people together in important and lasting ways. It is for this reason that he dedicates his life toward inspiring a new generation of young musicians to pursue their dreams through the challenging and life-changing process of music education.

Ching-Tan Shen, Composer 作曲家 沈錦堂

A renowned and prolific composer born in Hsinchu, Taiwan in 1940. Since Shen was a child, he loved singing and often made up his own tunes. He was accepted to the National Taiwan Academy of Art (the current National Taiwan University of Arts) in 1963, majored in composition under the tutelage of Mau-Liang Chen and Ker-Pei Shi. Shen also studied music at University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, as well as Brooklyn College, the City University of New York where he earned his master's degree. As one of its founding composers, Shen helped to set up the prestigious and innovative music showcase named "Sunflower Music Festival" in Taipei in 1967. His string quartet "Autumn Thought" was commissioned by Cloud Gate Dance Theatre in 1973. In the same year, his art song "Floating" was awarded the 1st prize of Patriotic Creation from the Ministry of Education in Taiwan. Shen's compositions include works for voice, instrument, chamber music, chorus, orchestra and opera in both traditional and classical music.



He served as a percussionist and administrator at National Taiwan Symphony Orchestra. As a music professor, he taught in Tunghai University, National

Taipei University of Arts, National Taipei University of Education, and Tainan University of Technology. Besides being a creative giant, Shen was devoted in nurturing numerous outstanding composers and musicians of Taiwan.

沈錦堂1940年3月22日出生於新竹關西,為臺灣客籍作曲家,1963年以非本科生之姿,考進國立藝專(今國立臺灣藝術大學)音樂科作曲組。師事陳懋良、史可培,正式接受嚴謹且紮實的音樂科班訓練。1968年國立藝專畢業後,任職於剛成立的臺北市立交響樂團,並與陳懋良、游昌發、馬水龍、溫隆信、賴德和共組「向日葵樂會」,定期發表音樂作品。

1970年轉赴國立台灣交響樂團前身台灣省立交響樂團,擔任演奏部主任與兼任打擊樂手。他不僅是「亞洲作曲家聯盟」的創始會員,並擔任理事一職,也在國際現代音樂協會中華民國總會、中華民國應用音樂推廣協會等組織擔任職務貢獻心力。1973年弦樂四重奏《秋思》為「雲門舞集」的創團舞碼之一,同年,藝術歌曲《漂流》榮獲教育廳愛國藝術歌曲創作獎第一名。由於其客籍文化背景,自七〇年代開始改編客家民歌,八〇年代開始在創作中引用客家民歌。兩千年後更創作多部以客家文化素材為主題的作品,例如:交響詩《客家情》及《客家頌》。沈錦堂會兩度赴歐美留學,分別是1979年赴奧地利維也納音樂學院及1991年赴美國紐約市立大學布魯克林學院音樂研究所。回國任教後兼任於東海大學、台南家專(今台南應用科技大學)、台北市立女師專(今台北市立教育大學),並專任於國立藝專。2005年自台灣藝術大學退休,持續執教於北藝大、北教大與道生神學院。

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
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
